Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost

SENTENCE:

For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, and through him to reconcile all things to himself, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross. Colossians 1.19-20.

FIRST READING

Genesis 2. 1-15

A reading from the book of Genesis

¹Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. ²And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. 3So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. ⁴ These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created. In the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens, ⁵when no plant of the field was yet in the earth and no herb of the field had yet sprung upfor the Lord God had not caused it to rain upon the earth, and there was no one to till the ground; ⁶but a stream would rise from the earth, and water the whole face of the ground-7then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being. 8And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east; and there he put the man whom he had formed. ⁹Out of the ground the Lord God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food, the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. ¹⁰ A river flows out of Eden to water the garden, and from there it divides and becomes four branches. ¹¹The name of the first is Pishon; it is the one that flows around the whole land of Havilah, where there is gold; ¹²and the gold of that land is good; bdellium and onyx stone are there. ¹³The name of the second river is Gihon; it is the one that flows around the whole land of Cush. ¹⁴The name of the third river is Tigris, which flows east of Assyria. And the fourth river is the Euphrates. ¹⁵ The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it.

Colossians 1. 15-23

A Reading from Paul's letter to the Colossians

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers —all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell,²⁰and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. ²¹ And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, ²²he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him— ²³provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

Revelations 21. 1-4, 22. 1-5.

A reading from the book of Revelations

¹Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; ⁴ he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away.' ²²Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb²through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. ³Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; 4 they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. ⁵And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

COME INTO THE GARDEN

There is a reason why gardening is ingrained in the human psyche.. It goes back to the first person and his relationship with the Creator. A race -memory of this persists, even in the Technology Age

There are two accounts of the creation of the human race in the first book of the Bible. Some authorities say they were written by two different people. But I think it is simply that time-honoured technique in recitation of oral history: recapitulation (going back over the story to cover details which would have spoiled the flow of the story if dealt with in their logical order).

There are several mysteries at the beginning of Genesis, chapter Two, mainly due to problematic translation, which is not surprising, given the traditional process of Hebrew into Greek, Greek into Latin and then Latin into English. The first concerns the description of the Earth before the creation of humankind. There were no trees. Springs, not mist, moistened the ground and it never rained, like much of Arabia, today.

Then there is the location of the Garden of Eden. The Four Rivers named, only Two are familiar: the Tigris and the Euphrates which flow East, out of what is now South-eastern Turkiye. The other two rivers are unable to be identified with any certainty. The Pishon River defines Havilah, which is defined elsewhere as Egypt. But whatever gold and precious stones there are in Egypt are all imported. Not so, Upper Egypt. (modern Sudan). But what relevance to Adam are gold and jewellery ? Not much ! But they do focus the attention of the audience in a recitation. The First Two rivers flowing out of Eden are possibly the White and Blue Nile. In any case, the rivers only tell where the Garden of Eden is NOT.

The real point is that the representative human was charged with working the garden and keeping it in good order as a tenant, not the proprietor. The private property in the Garden was the two trees at the centre. Adam had an obligation to tend them but was under a prohibition regarding eating the fruit of just one tree. The Tree of Life, that other tree, reappears at the end of the Bible. Its leaves are for healing.

There is only one truth. There can't be both "truth" and "alternative truth". Truth may be expressed in various languages and styles which give the impression of being incomplete (truth minus) or embellished (truth plus) Real truth is not the alleged "facts". Ethical scientists will, for instance, postulate theories and hypotheses rather than lead people down yet another shady dead-end alley. Truth is actually a person who asserted "I am the way, the truth and the life". This relationship is eternal and therefore utterly reliable. All other "truth" is subject to circumspect testing.
