Post Christmas reflection ...

Growing up, we always spent Christmas with extended family and we always had a 'kids table' at Christmas lunch.

I remember the year I graduated from the table and was given a spot with the adults. It was like a right of passage and I was excited. I also remember though there was a bit of me that missed the kids table that year - and a bit of me that has missed it every year since. It was only after moving to the big table that I began to appreciate the freedom and the community of the kids table. The world of the grown-up table was different. There were so many unspoken social niceties that constrained the grown-up table that had not been with us at the kids table. At the kids table we held our knives and forks exactly as we wished. If we didn't like something on our plate we put it on someone else's plate when they weren't looking. Inevitably someone ended up with a whole plate of peas and a huge mound of tomato and onion (why was that ever put on the kids plates I don't know?). We laughed a lot. There was no talk of trouble in the world or difficulties in our lives. We didn't endure each other, we enjoyed each other.

In the middle of the fun, there was an unspoken rule that we looked out for each other. We never left anyone with the whole plate of peas. If you just couldn't swallow the peas, someone who could tolerate them would eat the mandatory spoonful for you. We would invent ever more ingenious ways for the bravest person to be allowed to leave the table and then sneak everyone's offending tomato and onion back into the cooking pot in the kitchen and throw the pumpkin to the dog. We carried each other's burdens and looked out for each other.

When I looked over at our kids table this Christmas I saw my Father sitting with them laughing. Perhaps, we need to be reminded to give ourselves permission to have fun, to be light hearted and playful at times, even in the difficult circumstances of our lives. In our world where we are taught to look out for number one, the community of the kids table is a precious reminder and a refreshing change.

⁴¹ Now every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the festival of the Passover. 42 And when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. 43 When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. 44 Assuming that he was in the group of travellers, they went a day's journey. Then they started to look for him among their relatives and friends. 45 When they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem to search for him. 46 After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. ⁴⁷ And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. 48 When his parents saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, 'Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety.' 49 He said to them, 'Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' 50 But they did not understand what he said to them. 51 Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart. 52 And Jesus increased in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favour.
