OUR LADY OF FATIMA

Holy Eucharist

PP'S

Someone from our congregations has asked the following great question:

'Why do we hang on to all the "good" bits of the New Testament writings, especially from Paul, but either ignore the more controversial or difficult bits or explain them away by saying that he meant something else? Is it to fit in with the modern beliefs of our secular society?'

It is understandable that we are attracted to the more positive and affirming teachings of the New Testament, and of the Bible as a whole, but the questioner is right that we can do that to the detriment of letting ourselves be challenged and even rebuked by some of the harder words we find in Scripture. There is a saying that the Scriptures 'disturb the comfortable and comfort the disturbed.' We need both.

Some of the sayings of Jesus come to mind:

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart.' Matt 5:27-28 – from Jesus's Sermon on the Mount

"You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you: Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also, and if anyone wants to sue you and take your shirt, give your coat as well ... Matt 5:38-40

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy,' but I say to you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven ...' Matt 5:43-45

Granted there is a tendency to ignore or explain away the more difficult bits of Scripture, but it is also helpful to be aware of the various genres of Scriptural literature, and of literary devices such as hyperbole (exaggeration). The above passages are, I think, deliberately provocative to make a point – to get us thinking. Also in the Sermon on the Mount is Jesus's advice that if your eye causes you to offend, you should 'tear it out and throw it away.' Matt 5:29. The point of this saying is fairly obvious, but we do need to understand the role of hyperbole so as to prevent dangerous facial surgery!

As mentioned in answer to some other questions, we also need to understand Scriptural passages in their Ancient Near Eastern context, respecting that context, while also drawing out the meaning of texts for a 21st century world. At times, our Christian beliefs will stand in stark contrast to contemporary views, but at other times we can draw upon the best insights and knowledge available to us as a result of increased knowledge about the Bible and about our world. We as Christians can learn from secular society, while also providing challenge and comfort.

¹Paul and Timothy, servants of Christ Jesus, To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi, with the bishops and deacons: ² Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ³ I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴ constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵ because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷ It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸ For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. ⁹ And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰ to help you to determine what is best, so that on the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹ having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

¹ In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene,² during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. ⁵ Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; ⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God." '

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
